## MILAM COUNTY SHELTER IN PLACE ORDER April 6, 2020

ORDER OF THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF MILAM COUNTY, TEXAS DIRECTING ALL INDIVIDUALS LIVING IN THE COUNTY TO SHELTER AT THEIR PLACE OF RESIDENCE EXCEPT THAT THEY MAY LEAVE TO PROVIDE OR FURTHER, DIRECTING ALL BUSINESSES AND GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES TO CEASE NON-ESSENTIAL OPERATIONS AT PHYSICAL LOCATIONS IN THE RECEIVE CERTAIN ESSENTIAL SERVICES, ESSENTIAL GOVERMENTAL FUNCTIONS, ESSENTIAL TRAVEL OR ESSENTIAL ACTIVITIES.

WHEREAS, in December 2019, a novel coronavirus, now designated Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19), was detected in Wuhan County, Hubei Province, China;

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 as a pandemic and urged that all countries take urgent and aggressive action; and WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared a national emergency regarding COVID-19; and WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Governor Greg Abbott declared a state of disaster

due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 22, 2020, Governor Gregg Abbott issued orders dealing with hospital care during this crisis; and

WHEREAS disaster orders were issued by Milam County on March 19, 2020 and March 2020 which prohibited social gatherings; enacted a curfew for those 18 or younger

and urged every Milam County resident to shelter in place; and WHEREAS, on March 24, 2020 the Milam County Commissioners Court approved and imposed a shelter in place order for every citizen of Milam County which was effective

which effectively imposed a shelter in place order for every citizen of the State of Texas; through April 7, 2020; and WHEREAS, on March 29, 2020 Governor Gregg Abbott issued Executive Order GA-14



- 18. A violation of this Order is punishable by a fine of \$1,000.00 or 180 days in jail. Each day a violation exists shall be a separate violation.

19. This order to be effective on Monday, April 6, 2020 at 12:01 p.m. and will supersede the prior shelter in place order of March 24, 2020. The order will remain in effect through May 4, 2020.

## MEMORANDUM ON IDENTIFICATION OF ESSENTIAL CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE WORKERS DURING COVID-19 RESPONSE

As the Nation comes together to slow the spread of COVID-19, on March 16th, the President issued updated Coronavirus Guidance for America. This guidance states that:

Homeland Security, such as healthcare services and pharmaceutical and food supply, you "If you work in a critical infrastructure industry, as defined by the Department of have a special responsibility to maintain your normal work schedule." The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) executes the Secretary of Homeland Security's responsibilities as assigned under the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to provide strategic guidance, promote a national unity of effort, and coordinate the overall federal effort to ensure the security and resilience of the Nation's critical infrastructure. CISA uses trusted partnerships with both the public and private sectors to deliver infrastructure resilience assistance and guidance to a broad range of partners. In accordance with this mandate, and in collaboration with other federal agencies and the private sector, CISA developed an initial list of "Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers" to help State and local officials as they work to protect their communities, while ensuring continuity of functions critical to public health and safety, as well as economic and national security. The list can also inform critical infrastructure community decision-making to determine the sectors, sub-sectors, segments, or critical functions that should continue normal operations, appropriately modified to account for Centers for Disease Control (CDC) workforce and customer protection guidance. The attached list identifies workers who conduct a range of operations and services that are essential to continued critical infrastructure viability, including staffing operations centers, maintaining and call centers, working construction, and performing management functions, among others. The industries they support represent, but are not necessarily limited to, medical and healthcare, telecommunications, information technology systems, defense, food and agriculture, transportation and logistics, energy, water and wastewater, law enforcement, operating repairing critical infrastructure, and public works.

Instead, State and local officials should use their own judgment in using their authorities ensuring the continued delivery of critical infrastructure services and functions. CISA will continue to work with you and our partners in the critical infrastructure community to update this list as the Nation's response to COVID-19 evolves. We also encourage you to submit how you might use this list so that we can develop a repository of use cases for broad sharing across the country.

# THE IMPORTANCE OF ESSENTIAL CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE WORKERS

Functioning critical infrastructure is imperative during the response to the COVID-19 emergency for both public health and safety as well as community well-being. Certain critical infrastructure industries have a special responsibility in these times to continue operations.

This guidance and accompanying list are intended to support State, Local, and industry partners in identifying the critical infrastructure sectors and the essential workers needed to maintain the services and functions Americans depend on daily and that need to be able to operate resiliently during the COVID-19 pandemic response.

Promoting the ability of such workers to continue to work during periods of community restriction, access management, social distancing, or closure orders/directives is crucial to community This document gives guidance to State, local, tribal, and territorial jurisdictions and the private sector on defining resilience and continuity of essential functions.

# CONSIDERATIONS FOR GOVERNMENT AND BUSINESS

This list was developed in consultation with federal agency partners, industry experts, and State and local officials, and is based on several key principles:

- Response efforts to the COVID-19 pandemic are locally executed, State managed, and federally supported
- Everyone should follow guidance from the CDC, as well as State and local government officials, regarding strategies to limit disease spread.
- Workers should be encouraged to work remotely when possible and focus on core business activities. In-person, non-mandatory activities should be delayed until the resumption of normal operations.
- When continuous remote work is not possible, businesses should enlist strategies to reduce the likelihood of spreading the disease. This includes, but is not necessarily limited to, separating staff by off-setting shift hours or days and/or social distancing. These steps can preserve the workforce and allow operations to

- In the modern economy, reliance on technology and just-in-time supply chains means that certain workers must be able to access certain sites, facilities, and assets to ensure continuity of functions. Ö.
- Government employees, such as emergency managers, and the business community need to establish and maintain lines of communication. 7
- When government and businesses engage in discussions about critical infrastructure workers, they need to consider the implications of business operations beyond the jurisdiction where the asset or facility is located. Businesses can have sizeable economic and societal impacts as well as supply chain dependencies that are geographically distributed.  $\infty$
- Whenever possible, jurisdictions should align access and movement control policies related to critical infrastructure workers to lower the burden of workers crossing jurisdictional boundaries. 6

## **DEFENSE INDUSTRIAL BASE**

- Workers who support the essential services required to meet national security commitments to the federal government and U.S. Military. These individuals, include but are not limited to, aerospace; mechanical and software engineers, manufacturing/production workers; IT support; security staff; security personnel; intelligence support, aircraft and weapon system mechanics and maintainers
- Personnel working for companies, and their subcontractors, who perform under contract to the Department of Defense providing materials and services to the Department of Defense, and government-owned/contractor-operated and government-owned/government-operated facilities

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#### MILAM COUNTY DAY OF PRAYER April 6, 2020
